The Alcoholic Isn't Always The Problem

Andy, a middle-aged veteran had begun therapy because of a weekend binge. A reformed alcoholic, he had gone 15 months without drinking, only to get stinking drunk on vodka after a huge fight with his wife who flatly refused to even talk about his desire to buy a new car.

"I've got to do something," he said. "I drank two quarts of vodka Saturday and Sunday."

He had been to a 'de-tox' facility some 16 months before and had joined and attended Alcoholics Anonymous since his release.

"But what good does it do me?" he said. "I make some good money. My home is paid for. I'm at the place where I ought to be able to enjoy life. But I've got a big nothing!"

He went on to complain bitterly about his wife and how she had kept hurting him again and again throughout their 20 years of marriage.

"I don't know why I just don't leave," he repeated over and over. Yet he hadn't left.

I knew part of the story already.

Andy's daughter has been in to deal with her own problems, and had faced, at one point, her horror at seeing her father on the roof peak of the house, threatening to jump to his death to the pavement 55 feet below. This scene, she had reported, was typical of her father's behavior after awful fights year after year.

From the sound of Andy's complaints, I wouldn't know why he stayed in the marriage either. Why didn't he leave? Why hadn't he left long ago? There must be a reason. There was.

In a session about four months later, both he and his wife, Ann, were ready to face it. They had been coming in together for three months, and had definitely discovered both hope for their future and love for each other. Previously totally unexpressive, he had been able to 'break down' three separate times in the office, sharing with his wife and me some of the pain from within. Each time, he reported "I feel closer to both of you" after his 'breaking down' and sobbing while being held by both of us as we reaffirmed his right to share all his emotions. But during the week at his home, he had found himself unable to let it out.

His wife reported, "He has gone back to his old 'sighing' again. "Why can't I let it out at home?" he asked. "I can let

it out here. I trust you, but I can't seem to trust her."

"It has to do with your attitude," I told him. "You learned certain rules as a child about what to do with your feelings - 'we do this, we don't do that.' Sometimes these rules are spoken. More often they are simply assumed and enforced. You were programmed by your family rules, much like a TV game put into a computer. It's automatic. You learned things like 'If I feel pain, hold it in' or 'Anger is the opposite of love' or 'Don't be angry, be depressed' or 'Turn your anger in on yourself.'"

I shared with them the rules and attitudes involved with emotions reported by a couples' group that week.

He picked out of those that he had learned unawares.

'Keep it in', 'Turn anger in', 'If I show you my pain, you'll hurt me', 'If you are angry, you don't love me.'

"Part of me wants to let it out, but something says I can't do that," he said.

"Fold your arms across your chest," I said, "and imagine you're holding that little boy you used to be. Close your eyes and hold him and tell him 'I understand how you feel. I'm in charge now and I'll take care of you.'"

He folded his arms, closed his eyes and had barely spoken the words when his pain surfaced and he began to cry it out. As before, his wife and I moved to hold him, one on each side, giving permission to let it all out. This time, more came out than ever before, and he was relaxed, while still being held afterwards.

He told us how much better he was feeling.

"It's time to start believing your experience," I told him. "You let out your pain, contrary to the child's attitude 'If I let out my pain, you'll hurt me.' And you didn't get hurt. Instead you experienced love and closeness. Now things ARE different. THEN, the kid was right. THEN if you showed your pain, you would've been creamed. NOW it's different."

He turned to his wife -- "I can still remember times I did break down and you did make fun of me," he said.

"But that was long ago, before we ever started coming here," she answered. "I don't do that any more. (He agreed). I've learned alot. NOW I understand more how you feel."

I took the opportunity for sharing with them the old patterns.

"You, Andy, used to believe that if you show Ann your pain, she would hurt you. That was the childhood program. And when you and Ann would start fighting and you finally felt your pain, you added in your anger, turned-in-on-yourself, and the pain broke you down. You let it out. Then when Ann put you down for showing your pain, you used that to reinforce your old attitude.

"What you didn't know was that when we husbands and wives chose each other, we chose someone who can help us. I actually use my mate's anger and hostility, her cuts and barbs to lance the festering pain that is so deep inside I can't even get at it myself. But when the fight hits its climax, I feel that pain right on the surface. I'm swimming in it, and if I don't let it go, I could even drown in it. So I 'break down'

and let it out, and then I blame her for 'hurting' me. That way I can get in touch with the pain stored in my own depths, release it, feel relieved and still believe all my own attitudes and blame my mate.

"So Andy, you and Ann would get into your pattern when the depths were stirring -- it didn't matter about what. And you knew how to hurt each other, and you did. And then you'd get to the awful unconscious pain, which you had been carrying tucked away down deep ever since childhood. You would BOTH HURT, each blaming the other, both feeling RIGHT and never knowing it was a setup to help each other. You would remain stuck in your old attitudes and unhappiness. But now, in 1983 things are different. Now when you sigh at home, Ann comes over and says 'You're sighing, hold me' and as you hold her, you sigh together -- four, five or six deep sighs. The pain comes out and both feel happy and close."

Last month was their 28th anniversary and it was also their first. It was the first happy anniversary they could ever remember.

Andy has reported he has gone through several stressful situations this year, any of which would have sent him back to the bottle in the old days. "And," he adds with a big, relaxed smile, "I haven't even felt the urge to drink!"
