TANCE RYNICK IN MEMORIAM

I'm about to take some journalistic liberties here. . . and that's OK. To write a memoriam with only the basic information seems highly inappropriate as well as unsubstantial when it comes to Tance Rynick. So, I've decided to write this subjectively and not apologize for it.

Tance died Friday, July 17, 1987 as the result of an aneurysm that happened suddenly with little warning. She had been hospitalized 10 days. In spite of her critical condition and up until a few days before her death, she was, at times, talking, laughing and enjoying the company of her family and friends, who loyally and lovingly stayed by her side.

Most all of you in the ISNIP have met and experienced Tance at one time or another throughout her long involvement in the N.I.P. And you have been fortunate in having that time with her. Each of you, I'm sure, have your own special remembrances of and stories about her. . . and that's good. You can hold on to them always. They're yours. I have mine as well, spanning many years.

George and Tance brought the N.I.P. to Binghamton years ago (I've lost count of how many at this point). When Ron was introduced to it soon after its debut, through George and Tance, he was enthusiastic. I watched him grow while my life remained status quo and I got scared and oh so hostile about this N.I.P. stuff. But it was through George and Tance's warmth, reassurance and belief in this Process (and in me) that I began to believe in myself. The explicit trust I

developed for the Process was gained through my absolute trust in them. That was my beginning, and for which I'm deeply grateful. Tance was first my psychological mother, and soon after, my friend.

Tance's warm, smiling eyes invited closeness from others (did you pay attention to those eyes?). And if it's true that the eyes are the gateway to the soul, then she allowed her soul to be exposed in an often loving, reassuring way to those who knew her. But her absolute trademark (beside her penchant for shoes, shoes and more shoes) was her laugh. Full-bodied, totally infectious and thoroughly delightful, that laugh could catch anyone up into it. You **knew** — unquestionably — when Tance was having fun (with a capital "F"). Even now I can turn on my videotape of the ISNIP banquet and skit, immediately tune into her laugh, and find myself smiling.

But Tance was also a 'rock'. Serious Tance was highly organized (I was in awe of those skills and would let her know), and so very much at home in the therapist mode. She knew when to confront, nurture, move in, back off, place a gentle hand on a slumped shoulder, hug, smile or ROAR — all with an innate sensitivity. Her clients are well aware of that, as are her family and friends. Her unfailing belief in the Process and work in the Society has helped immeasurably to spread the word of the N.I.P. I am certain Dan is giving her a big hug now. How proud he must be!

The pain has not left me nor the rage at losing such a good friend, colleague, teacher. And yet I trust that acceptance of the reality, will eventually occur. For all of us. We love you, Tance!

Our deep sympathy is extended to George, Deb, Kath and Susie.

The Importance of Bonding in New Identity Process Therapy

Bonding is a process of physical closeness combined with emotional openness, although in man and in other primates, neither alone will meet developmental needs for growth, interpersonal security, caring, trust, closeness, emotional satisfaction, and, later maturation, normal identity, and parental capacity. Severe degrees of bonding deprivation, as in chaotic families, can lead to alcohol, drug, and other forms of abuse. Lesser degrees lead to separation anxiety, and the relationship and trust incapacity seen in children of alcoholic parents. Bonding is not precious like diamonds, but as essential as air and water.

Satisfaction of the need for bonding gives rise to pleasure. This is not primarily sexual because it is present before genital sexuality and because sex without emotional openness does not meet bonding needs. The greater the lack of adequate bonding, the more we do not feel lovable, good enough, or entitled to joy or even existence. The anguish of this deprivation leads to a search for substitute satisfactions or to a denial of need, or to a phobic avoidance of emotional life and closeness.

Western culture appears to have created a social and familial structure in which deprivation of bonding is almost universal from the early years on. As a consequence, much of the population has emotional problems, the sources of which they cannot remember. In the adult, most people have access only to memories stored in verbal contexts, and, at least initially, memories stored in childhood language, or which are preverbal, are not accessible, or unleash fearful primitive emotions as they begin to be accessible in treatment. Only physical close contact with another provides the missing early bonding situation which repairs the never-corrected lack of object constancy and makes safe deep emotional work, and the sharing of pleasure to which its success leads.

Guidelines for Bonding in New Identity Process Work

In mother-child bonding, there is physical contact from shoulder to knees between the two in a bonding activity. Initially, in New Identity Process groups, this was achieved by having group members hold each other while standing and doing emotional work. However, for more than a decade, bonding work has been done on mats in the groups. The bonding contact is carried out between consenting members of the group, or between a therapist and a group member. It is made clear to all participants that bonding is not obligatory, that a request to bond with a particular person may be accepted, refused, or discontinued at any time by either of the participants. Bonding is ordinarily discontinued during active work on anger or rage, although experienced therapists have techniques for self-protection during such work. The holding person does not have a passive role in bonding work. She/he recognizes that work on deep feelings requires verbal and physical protection, together with appropriate verbal interventions to help the person working

achieve redecisions about early and current emotional and attitudinal issues.

Certain special issues require particular mention. All members of the group agree not to use the bonding experience for sexual advances, even though pleasure and closeness are the natural outcome of successful work on the mat. All participants are expected to be comfortably clothed. The use of special bonding rooms for prolonged bonding creates a requirement for therapeutic supervision since participants depend upon this supervision to indicate protection and propriety. The persons bonding may be of either sex.

Statement of the Ethics Committee, and I.S.N.I.P. Board of Directors

The employment of physical closeness bonding experiences between clothed consenting participants in New Identity Process therapy is an essential feature for the ability of New Identity Process work to induce important therapeutic change in emotions, behavior, and attitudes; and to provide a therapeutic situation favoring maturation, individuation, and correction of severe individual and interpersonal psychopathology. *Bonding experiences which conform to the Guidelines preceding this statement do not constitute undue familiarity between therapist and client, nor between clients.*

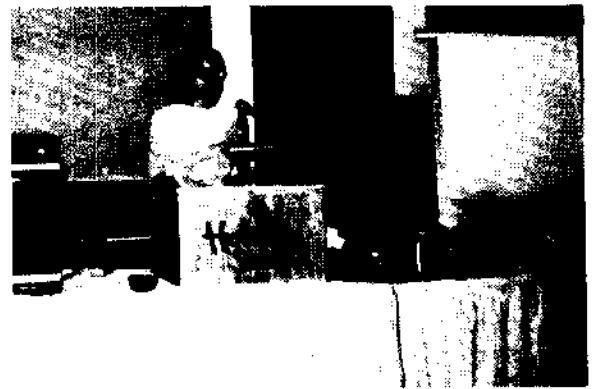
